

FOSTERS

- "Cat tested/good with cats" does not mean "turn this
 dog loose with your cats" immediately it means this
 dog didn't react in a controlled environment to a dog
 savvy cat, or that we have second hand information
 that it cohabitated with cats before, and you still have
 to do slow intros with guidance.
- Crate/potty/leash training are not innate skills, and the foster is the foster dog's guide for this! If you need help, please ask someone or use the resources in the handbook or in the files in our Facebook group.

OFFICE

- It is very important that if you need assistance from the office staff to ring the bell! There are behavior dogs at the office and opening the door that leads to the back could result in a bite.
- Bring back any kennels you are not using as we are running low.

ADOPTIONS

- Do not forget to get an adoption picture of your foster with their new family for the main page.
- Please contact applicants quickly after their application is approved.
- Please tell the new family what things your fosters enjoy so they can purchase them for them. Try not to send Rescue One items.
- Please take orientation seriously and use the resources available to you. Always reach out for help when needed and remember that perfect dogs not only do not exist but if they did they would not end up in a rescue. It takes work!

All medication refills and health certificates MUST be requested in advance. If you do call and no one answers, please leave a message or email. Do not hang up and keep calling as they are on the other line. With the number of animals in our care, the clinic is very busy and we thank you with helping things flow more smoothly! Reminder- we are closed on the weekends except for animal care!


Marita Johnson- Griffith

TRAINING TIP

OPTIONS FOR "SLOW" DOG TO DOG INTRODUCTIONS

METHOD	DESCRIPTION
PARALLEL WALKING	Walk both dogs on separate leashes with separate handlers. Start at a large distance (30 ft or across the street), walking in the same direction. Let one dog get ahead of the other at this distance, and take turns with which dog is in front. If that goes well, you can decrease the distance and allow brief (3-5 sec) sniffing. If needed, increase the distance.
CIRCLE WALKING	Start with dogs walking in a large (40ft) circle at opposite sides of the circle. Move going one way around the circle and then switch directions. This method is helpful for dogs that want to "be in front" and helps avoid head-on introductions. You can take turns passing, slowly decreasing the size of the circle, and allow brief (3-5 sec) sniffs. If needed, increase the distance and exit the circle.
PROTECTED CONTACT	Allow both dogs to get comfortable with the area at a distance, then let the dogs see and greet each other through a barrier like a section of fence. Practice cheerfully calling the dogs back to their handlers and keep interactions brief. If possible, do not use your yard's fence in case your animals react to the new dog at the edge of your property.
CRATE INTROS	Set up the foster's crate and allow it to acclimate to the area without your dogs around. Send your foster to the crate with the help of a tasty snack. Give the foster time to finish the snack and then bring a single personal dog out to meet the new foster. If your dog starts to annoy the foster or if the foster is uncomfortable, increase the distance between the dogs. If that goes well, put your dogs away, then allow the foster to investigate your dogs. If the dogs are comfortable with the crate and near each other but uncertain you may also try creating them near each other.
CONSENT TEST	If the dogs seem to be happy and playing, you can drop the leashes and let the dogs drag them. To check that they both are having fun, call them over and hold the leash of the more active dog (the chaser, pinner, humper etc.). Observe the other dog. If the dog that was being chased or pinned goes back to the dog being restrained with soft wiggly body language, we can assume that they are consenting to that style of play for now so you can drop the leash again.

HELPFUL HINTS

- Remove toys, chews, food, and anything your personal dog may guard in the home.
- Meet on neutral ground away from your yard first if possible.
- Try to keep leashes loose but manage the distance to prevent surprise lunging.
- Prevent face-to-face greets and allow them to sniff along each other's body. Take your time; going slow and having the dogs get along is easier than repairing a fractured relationship.
- Actively supervise interactions between foster and personal dogs for at least 2 weeks after successful introductions. Some fosters may always need direct supervision.
